### The Angel's Visit to Mary

### Joseph's Faith and Obedience

Joseph's role in the birth of Jesus is often overlooked, but his response to the news of Mary's pregnancy is a powerful example of faith, humility, and obedience. Initially, Joseph planned to quietly break off his engagement to Mary, wanting to protect her from disgrace. However, God intervened through an angel who appeared to Joseph in a dream and revealed the divine nature of Mary's pregnancy.

 Matthew 1:20-21 (NIV): "But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

 Luke 2:4-7 (NIV): "So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. ### The Shepherds and the Angels

• Luke 2:8-11 (NIV): "And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord."
