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Introduction to Rahab (Joshua 2:1-7)

<u>Setting</u>: Rahab is introduced as a prostitute living in the fortified city of Jericho.

The Mission: Two Israelite spies sent by Joshua come to her house during their reconnaissance mission. Rahab hides them, knowing the king of Jericho's men are searching for them.

<u>Significance</u>: Despite her occupation, Rahab recognizes the hand of God at work and chooses to align herself with His people rather than her own.

Rahab's Faith Declaration (Joshua 2:8-11)

Professing Faith: Rahab expresses her belief in the God of Israel. She acknowledges His power and sovereignty, saying, "The Lord your God is God in heaven above and on the earth below" (Joshua 2:11).

Key Theme: Rahab demonstrates a remarkable faith in God, even though she was a Gentile and had limited knowledge of Him.

Rahab's Pact with the Spies (Joshua 2:12-21)

<u>A Request for Protection:</u> Rahab asks the spies to spare her and her family when Israel conquers Jericho.

The Scarlet Cord: The spies agree, instructing her to tie a scarlet cord in her window as a sign of her faith and a marker for her household's safety.

Symbolism: The scarlet cord is often interpreted as a foreshadowing of the blood of Christ, representing salvation and redemption.

Rahab's Legacy in Scripture

<u>Mention in the Genealogy of Jesus (Matthew</u> <u>1:5)</u> Rahab is listed as the mother of Boaz, an ancestor of King David, and ultimately, Jesus Christ.

<u>Significance:</u> This highlights her inclusion in God's redemptive plan and His ability to use anyone for His purposes.

Rahab in the "Hall of Faith" (Hebrews 11:31)

Rahab is praised for her faith: "By faith the prostitute Rahab, because she welcomed the spies, was not killed with those who were disobedient."

<u>Key Takeaway:</u> Her actions were driven by faith, not fear, earning her a place among the heroes of faith.

Rahab's Legacy in Scripture

Faith Demonstrated in Action (James 2:25)

James emphasizes Rahab's faith as active and alive: "In the same way, was not even Rahab the prostitute considered righteous for what she did when she gave lodging to the spies and sent them off in a different direction?"

Application: This highlights the importance of faith coupled with works.

Key Themes and Lessons

Faith Can Overcome Labels: Rahab's identity as a prostitute didn't limit her from being part of God's plan.

Lesson: God values faith and obedience over societal labels or past mistakes.

<u>Courage in the Face of Fear:</u> Rahab risked her life to protect the spies and align with God's purposes.

Lesson: True faith requires boldness and trust in God's protection.

<u>God's Redemption is for All:</u> Rahab's story shows that God's grace extends to all people, regardless of their background.

Lesson: No one is beyond the reach of God's transformative power.

Key Themes and Lessons
