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Understanding John 10:10

John 10:10 (NIV): "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."

John 10:10 is part of Jesus' discourse about being the Good Shepherd. To fully understand this verse, it's crucial to recognize the context in which Jesus spoke. He was contrasting Himself with false shepherds—those who lead people astray and leave them vulnerable to spiritual harm. Emma committed to prioritizing her spiritual health by starting her mornings with prayer and Scripture, which transformed her approach to work and life.

To experience the full life Jesus promises, it's essential to recognize when we are under the influence of the "thief" and redirect our hearts and minds to Him. The abundant life isn't about having a perfect, problem-free existence but finding fullness, joy, and purpose in Christ regardless of circumstances. Identifying the Thieves in Our Lives

These "thieves" might not always be overtly evil; sometimes they are the subtle compromises we make or the unnoticed habits that draw us away from God. Recognizing them empowers us to take steps to safeguard our hearts and minds, relying on Christ as our protector and source of true abundance.
